TOPIC

How to treat coronavirus stimulus and relief payments under the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, including additional Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation and recovery rebate payments for Minnesota Health Care Programs (MHCP).

PURPOSE

This bulletin provides information about the treatment of coronavirus stimulus and relief payments issued under the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, when determining eligibility for MHCP.

TERMINOLOGY NOTICE

The terminology used to describe people we serve has changed over time. The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the use of "People First" language.

I. Background

In December 2020, Congress passed a new coronavirus stimulus and relief package as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (CAA). The CAA provides financial aid to individuals and families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic by extending unemployment relief available through Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) payments, and providing new recovery rebate payments in addition to those previously issued under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

This bulletin describes how the additional FPUC and recovery rebate payments are treated for purposes of determining eligibility for Medical Assistance (MA) and MinnesotaCare applicants and enrollees. These policies are effective January 1, 2021.

The policies described in this bulletin apply to all of the following MA populations and programs:

- Medical Assistance for Families with Children and Adults (MA-FCA)
- Medical Assistance for People Age 65 and Older, Blind or Disabled (MA-ABD)
- Medical Assistance for Employed Persons with Disabilities (MA-EPD)
- Medical Assistance under the TEFRA Option
- Medical Assistance Northstar Care for Children
- Medical Assistance for the Treatment of Breast and Cervical Cancer (MA-BC)
- Medical Assistance for People Receiving Services at the Center for Victims of Torture (MA-CVT)
- Medicare Savings Programs (MSP): Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries (QMB), Service Limited Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMB), Qualified Individuals (QI) and Qualified Working Disabled (QWD)
- Emergency Medical Assistance (EMA)
- Minnesota Family Planning Program (MFPP)

The policies described in this bulletin apply to all MinnesotaCare populations.

The policies described in this bulletin apply to all MA and MinnesotaCare applicants and enrollees, including enrollees from or receiving services from a tribal nation.

II. Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation **Payments**

FPUC payments were previously addressed in bulletin #20-21-05. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act provided financial aid to individuals and families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic by temporarily supplementing unemployment insurance (UI) benefit amounts and extending the duration of those benefits. From March 27, 2020, through July 31, 2020, UI claimants received their usual calculated benefit plus an additional \$600 per week in FPUC.

The CAA adds a new 11-week period during which FPUC payments are available from December 27, 2020, to March 14, 2021. The amount of the new FPUC payments is \$300 per week. The new FPUC payments are treated the same as previous FPUC payments when determining eligibility for MA and MinnesotaCare.

For MA applicants or enrollees, do not count FPUC payments as income. Continue to count regular unemployment insurance (UI) benefits as income for MA.

For MA applicants and enrollees with an asset limit, count FPUC payments and regular UI payments retained after the month of receipt as an asset.

For MinnesotaCare applicants and enrollees, count FPUC payments and regular UI benefits in a person's projected annual income (PAI).

III. Recovery Rebate Payments

Recovery rebate payments (referred to as Federal CARES Act payments) were previously addressed in bulletin #20-21-04. In early 2020, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) issued Federal CARES Act payments of up to \$1,200 for individuals, \$2,400 for married couples and \$500 per dependent child under 17.

The new recovery rebate payments provided under the CAA are authorized by an amendment to the CARES Act, and the CAA provides additional recovery rebate payments on top of those previously provided under the CARES Act. The IRS will issue payments of up to \$600 for individuals, \$1,200 for married couples and \$600 per dependent child under 17. The new payments are treated the same as the previous CARES Act recovery rebate payments when determining eligibility for MA and MinnesotaCare.

For MA applicants or enrollees, do not count CAA recovery rebate payments as income.

For MA for Families and Children and Adults (MA-FCA) applicants and enrollees who have a spenddown and are subject to an asset test, exclude CAA recovery rebate payments as an asset. There is no time limit for this asset exclusion.

For MA for a person who is age 65 or older, blind or has a disability (MA-ABD) and Medicare Savings Program (MSP) applicants and enrollees who have an asset test, exclude CAA recovery rebate payments as an asset for 12 months after the month of receipt.

For MinnesotaCare applicants or enrollees, do not count CAA recovery rebate payments in a person's PAI.

IV. Action Required

County, tribal and DHS workers must follow the policies outlined in this bulletin. Procedures associated with the policies in this bulletin are in ONEsource.

In keeping with Emergency Executive Order 20-12, DHS is maintaining coverage for MA and MinnesotaCare enrollees for the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency. Therefore, for individuals who were enrolled in MA or MinnesotaCare on or after March 18, 2020, do not take negative action on a case unless the enrollee can be closed for a reason permitted under the temporary COVID-19 emergency policies.
